FEBUARY 26TH - 27TH, 2022 // BAPTISM WEEKEND

HEAVEN INVADE (JOHN 3:1-16)

During Jesus's earthly ministry, He performed many signs, wonders, and healings in the presence of the Jewish people, and many believed in Him.

- But the religious leaders of the day weren't quite sure what to make of Him.
- Was He a blasphemer? Insane? A prophet? Or the Messiah? .
- John records that one religious leader, a Pharisee by the name of Nicodemus, came to Jesus under ٠ the cover of night to see for himself.
- Nicodemus starts his conversation with Jesus in a respectful tone, calling him "Rabbi" (teacher) and admitting that He has come from God.
- But Jesus cuts right through Nicodemus's religious formalities and gets to the heart of the matter.
- Jesus "answers" Nicodemus with a blunt statement "unless one is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." (3:3)
- A response like this would've probably taken anyone off guard!
- It's almost as if Jesus is perceiving the real intent behind this meeting and Nicodemus's words.
- It's as if Jesus is really answering the question he doesn't know how to ask yet "How do we find God? How do we find reality, meaning, and redemption in this life?"
- Many Jews believed that entering into the Kingdom of the Messiah was assured by their birth (their racial identity or religious pedigree) - but Jesus shattered that notion.
- Others believed that they must do a religious work to reform their life, cleanse their soul, or earn a place in the Kingdom - but being born isn't something we do, it's something that happens to us!
- Nicodemus is genuinely perplexed how can someone be born a 2nd time?
- Jesus's answer "unless one is born of water and the Spirit, he cannot enter the Kingdom of God."
- Being "born of the Spirit" is easily interpreted—to enter into God's Kingdom we must enter into a spiritual new life that only the Holy Spirit can produce.
- But being, "born of water"? What's that all about?
- One interpretation is that "born of water" refers to physical birth.
- Unborn babies float in a sack of amniotic fluid for nine months.
- When the time for birth arrives, that sack of "water" bursts, and the baby is born in a rush of water, entering a new world and new family.
- Jesus is drawing a parallel between **a physical reality** and a spiritual truth.
- The other interpretation is that being "born of water" refers to spiritual cleansing.
- Nicodemus, as a Pharisee, would have naturally understood it that way (Ezekiel 36).
- Throughout the OT, water is used figuratively of spiritual cleansing.
- When Jesus made this claim, He was referring to humanity's need for spiritual cleansing. .
- We all have the same spiritual problem.

HUMANITY'S BIGGEST PROBLEM IS CORRUPTION

We live in a world of natural evil (diseases, disasters, death) and of moral evil (war, slavery, murder/violence, terrorist attacks, genocide, fraud, theft, and abuse).

- But we also live with a sense of internal evil (selfishness/greed, deceit, gluttony/addiction, pride, hatred, lust/sexual immorality).
- Every one of us has participated in this evil and corruption on some level (Rom. 3:23).
- Many of us look to morality, religion, or even the law of God as a set of rules that, if followed, will quarantee entrance into heaven after death.
- The problem is that God requires perfection, He doesn't grade on a curve (James 2:10), and it's **IMPOSSIBLE** for any of of us to follow the law of God perfectly.
- The purpose of God's Law is to open our eyes to the fact that we can't perfectly obey the Law, and are therefore in need of God's mercy and grace.
- Jesus's invitation to Nicodemus (and to all of us) is that if we want **citizenship** in the Kingdom of God and eternal life, we must experience 1) a spiritual rebirth, 2) a spiritual cleansing.
- So many of us come to Jesus like Nicodemus politely and religiously looking for the work we must do to get from Him what we want .
- . But Jesus turns everything upside down - He says you must be reborn and your sins must be atoned for. But how does that work?

"FOR GOD SO LOVED THE WORLD ... " (VS.16)

God didn't wait for the world to turn to Him before He loved the world by sending Jesus the Son to die in the place of those who would believe in Him.

- Heaven invaded earth when Jesus broke into our corrupted, sinful, painful existence to die the death we deserved because of our sin. ٠
- This is a love unlike **anything else** in the universe.

"...WHOEVER BELIEVES IN HIM SHOULD NOT PERISH, BUT HAVE EVERLASTING LIFE." (VS.17)

- To "believe" in Him is much more than an intellectual agreement or awareness it means to "trust in", "rely on", or "cling to".
- To be, "born again" into this Kingdom of Heaven and everlasting life is simply a matter of faith in God's Son, Jesus.
- It's to receive Him into our lives as rightful King. .
- (2 Corinthians 5:17), (1 John 1:7), (Acts 3:19)

REPENTANCE IS...

- Turning from sin (Matt. 4:17, Acts 3:19), Turning from self (Luke 9:23, Mark 8:35), Changing of the mind and heart (Isaiah 55:6-7), a personal decision to make a clean break from lifestyles and patterns of
- A submission to the Word of God and ways of God and what it says about us, our sin, life, and who God • is (Psalm 51:4).

FAITH IN CHRIST NECESSARY FORE SALVATION.

Saving faith in Christ is personal trust in Jesus as a living person that offers forgiveness of sins, eternal life with God, and a life in the Kingdom of God here and now.

- Acts 16:30-31
- An active trust in the power, promise, and person of Christ for salvation (John 6:37).
- An absolute surrender to the Lordship and authority of Christ (Romans 10:9).

WATER BAPTISM.

Baptism is simply our public, symbolic profession of faith in our allegiance to Jesus as savior & Lord.

- It's our way as disciples of Jesus of publicly declaring before the people of God...
- "I've repented of my sins." (burial by water), "I've been cleansed of my sins." (washing by water), "I am a new creation in Christ." (rising from the water), "I intend to follow Him with my life." (identifying with Christ)
- (Acts 2:38-39,41), (Matthew 28:19-20), (Matthew 3:16-17) ٠
- Baptism is something we do physically that symbolizes what God has done in us spiritually.
- Baptism is how we as disciples of Jesus profess the change that has occurred in us through active faith in Jesus Christ.
- Baptism symbolizes the washing and cleansing of sin we experience in salvation (Titus 3:5, Acts 22:16) Baptism shows that we've been forgiven, covered, and given a new life and purpose. Baptism symbolizes the union we share with Christ as we find in Him salvation and embrace His call to discipleship (Rom. 6:3-4, Col. 2:12). Baptism shows that we've been changed and given a new identity! (2 Cor. 5:17). Baptism is a symbol of beginning the Christian life, so it's given only to those who have already begun the Christian life (Acts 2:41) - it shows outwardly what's already happened inwardly.

"WHAT ARE WE SAYING WHEN WE'RE BAPTIZED?"

- 1. I'm a sinner unable to make myself right before God.
- 2. Jesus died for me the death I deserved b/c of my sin and rose again.
- 3. I've repented of my sin.
- I'm trusting in Christ to be made right before God. 4.
- I now want all the world to know it. 5.

MR. FORMALIST & MR. HYPOCRISY

Mr. Formalist is a religious performer (external religion) and Mr. Hypocrisy is a religious pretender (counterfeit religion). Both men wanted a shortcut around the path of conversion and repentance- so they satisfied themselves with a "form of godliness" (2 Tim. 3:5).

Regardless of their confident assurance in their "shortcut", both end up getting lost and perishing.

THE "SHORTCUTS" OF EXTERNAL AND COUNTERFEIT RELIGION.

- Moralism, trying to be a "good" person.
- Creating our own versions of God, salvation, and the afterlife.
- Growing up in a "Christian home", church attendance or membership, religious activities. ٠
- Walking an aisle, repeating the sinner's prayer, confirmation, or baptism without true repentance ٠ or faith.

WHAT RELIGION CAN DO ...

- Make you an expert at judging and condemning everyone but yourself.
- Create in you entitlement, self-righteousness, and a casual attitude towards your sin.
- It can make you smug, overly-sensitive, critical, hypocritical, and insecure.
- It can blind you to your need for God and Christian community/accountability.
- Religion can't fix you, transform you, change you, or save your soul from judgment.
- What the Gospel is inviting you into is NOT outward conformity to a set of rules, laws, and morals-٠ you're being offered new heart (Ezekiel 36:26), a new life (John 3:3), and a new identity (2 Cor. 5:17).
- The only way to enter into the Kingdom of Heaven is to be born again. Have you professed this in baptism?
