NO LONGER BOUND (GALATIANS 4:1-11) GRACE IS GREATER THAN WORKS

In this portion of Paul's letter, he attempts to show the Galatians how **grace** is **superior to the law**. First, he uses the comparison of a child heir and a slave to reveal how their spiritual immaturity is keeping them in bondage to the law.

• Our works ("adherence to the law") alone cannot create a closeness to God.

CHOOSING TO BE RULED

Paul speaks to Roman custom, where a child became an adult when the father thought they were ready. He compares a child (though an heir), still being ruled by their father and lacking freedom, to a slave.

"When I was a child, I spoke like a child, I thought like a child, I reasoned like a child. When I became a man, I put aside childish things" (1 Corinthians 13:11).

GOING BACKWARDS

Using the comparison of a child being under guardians and trustees is in reference to earlier language in his letter (3:25), where Paul says the law was given as a guardian until Christ came.

 They still act like children under the law instead of heirs under grace—like an adult going back to childish ways or someone purchased into freedom going back into slavery.

WHAT IS SHAPING US?

Paul says, "when we were children, [we] were in slavery under the elements of the world." "Elements" means a line of things, like a file of soldiers, but later came to mean the ABCs or any elementary knowledge.

 As we spiritually mature, we should move away from our childish understanding and being shaped by the world.

A WARNING ABOUT ELEMENTAL PRINCIPLES

Paul, in another letter, warns Christians to be careful not to be taken captive by false teaching based on the elements of the world (Colossians 2:8).

• If we have died with Christ, then we have died to the elemental principles of the world, but why do we continue to live as if we still belonged to the world (Colossians 2:20). Why are we quick to submit to regulations but not Christ?

WE ARE NO LONGER BOUND

When the time was right, Christ came to redeem those under the law so we might receive adoption as sons.

Everyone is part of God's offspring, through creation, but only those who are adopted as children
of God receive the Spirit and the ability to cry out "Abba, Father" as Jesus did (Mark 14:36).

"I NEVER KNEW YOU..." (MATTHEW 7:21-23)

Being known by God is more important than just knowing God. Being known by God means that we are in an intimate relationship with Him and are accepted by Him.

 To not be known by God means we are not in a relationship with Him and may be trying to earn a right standing through works.

NEVER FORGET (GALATIANS 4:12-20)

IMITATE ME AS I IMITATE CHRIST (1 CORINTHIANS 11:1)

Paul begged the Galatians to return to the truth they once held and to "become as [he is]."

Paul wants them to become as consistent as he is. They started out with the true gospel as he
presented it to them, but many had strayed away. Paul wants them to experience his freedom in
Christ instead of returning to bondage under the law.

REMEMBER WHERE WE ONCE WERE

Paul relates to the Galatians by saying, "I also have become as you are." Paul was perfectly equipped to walk them out of legalism into freedom because of past experiences as a zealous Pharisee.

• It would be good for us to remember where we came from and where we are now in Christ (1 Corinthians 6:11).

NOT SPEAKING FROM HURT OR OFFENSE

Paul reiterates that he is not writing this way because they have wronged him. In fact, they received him, treated him well, and "did not despise or reject [him] though [his] physical condition was a trial for [them]."

 It's possible that Paul is referring to when he and his companions were persecuted and stoned almost to death (Acts 14:19–20).

REMEMBER THE GENEROSITY I WAS SHOWN

It seems that whatever the infirmity was, it affected his eyes. He uses hyperbole to show the extent of generosity he was shown, stating **they would have plucked out their own eyes and given them to him.**

 At this time, physical infirmities and illnesses were incorrectly viewed as divine displeasure or punishment, and though Paul seemed weak and afflicted, they welcomed him.

REMEMBER HOW YOU USED TO RESPOND

Not only did the people of Galatia receive Paul, but they also responded to the message he preached of grace and God's love.

• The Galatians should remember how they responded to Paul's teaching and receive this letter with the same attitude, not thinking of Paul as an adversary for confronting them with the truth.

THE TRUTH ABOUT THE JUDAIZERS

Paul warns the Galatians that **they are being "courted" by the Judaizers**, and though they are being "love bombed," **the end result is no good**.

 Paul indicates that they intend to draw them away from him and bring them into their group of "super-Christians" who observe all the Jewish laws and traditions as if that makes them holier than others.

"MY CHILDREN..."

Paul rightly and affectionately considers himself a parent to the Galatians. Likening himself to a "mother" who experienced labor pains in "spiritually birthing" them as they came to accept the gospel, Paul says he is experiencing similar pains as they attempt to depart from it.

Paul vowed to continue to labor until Christ was formed in them.

CHILDREN OF PROMISE (GALATIANS 4:21-31)

THE ALLEGORY OF ISAAC AND ISHMAEL

The Judaizers proudly boasted that they were Abraham's descendants, so Paul pointed out that **Abraham had two sons: Ishmael and Isaac.**

 Paul does not give a ton of detail surrounding the story of Abraham, Hagar, and Sarah (Genesis 16) because he assumes they were familiar with the story.

ISHMAEL WAS BORN AS A RESULT OF THE FLESH

Abraham's first son was Ishmael, who was born by Hagar, his wife's servant. Ishmael was **born out of unbelief and an attempt to accomplish God's promises on their own.**

Hagar represents the covenant on Mt. Sinai (the law and 1st Century Jerusalem). This covenant
gives birth to bondage: what I can do and not what Christ has done.

ISAAC WAS BORN THROUGH PROMISE

Abraham's second son was Isaac, who was born miraculously through Abraham's wife Sarah. Isaac was born out of faith and God's promise.

 Sarah represents the covenant of Jerusalem above (the new Jerusalem in heaven). This covenant brings freedom: Jesus has paid it all, and we do not have to—it's not about what we can do, but what He has already done.

WE ARE CHILDREN OF PROMISE

Paul's solution to the problem is clear: We must "drive out the slave and her son, for the son of the slave will never be a coheir with the son of the free woman."

The blending of law and grace cannot exist as principles for our Christian life. Paul knew what it was like trying to earn favor before God, but now he knew the freedom in Christ.

INVENTORY

- We do good to remember where we came from and where we are in Christ.
- As heirs, we should be crying out, "Abba." Is there something louder than our cries?
- Are we experiencing consistency and freedom in Christ?
- We need truth more than we need to feel good about where we are.
