APRIL 21ST, 2024 // 2 CORINTHIANS

ABUNDANT LOVE (2 CORINTHIANS 1:23-2:4) TELL THE TRUTH

Paul takes a serious oath on his life, calling on God as a witness, when Jesus taught that we should live out what we say in a way that oaths are not necessary (Matthew 5:33–37).

 It is not taught that oaths are prohibited, but that we should do what we say and not use oaths to add weight to our words or to deceive.

A SACRIFICIAL SERVANT (MARK 10:44-45)

Paul could have used his authority and demanded respect, but he operated from a place of patience and love instead of lording his authority over them.

 Paul is clearly a leader of men, but he is not anyone's lord. He sets the example for leaders in the church to be co-laborers with their people to increase joy.

PAUL SHOWS WISDOM AND RESTRAINT

Some in Corinth thought Paul was not a man of integrity and did not come to them a second time out of selfish reasons.

 Paul shows that his decision not to visit the church in Corinth after leaving Macedonia was not done selfishly, but out of great concern for them and wanting to spare them another sorrowful visit full of conflict and unpleasantness.

WORKING TOWARD A PLEASANT VISIT

Paul wanted to give them time to process his rebukes and remove the opportunity for them to react hastily out of offense or hurt.

 Paul wrote a letter so that when they met face-to-face, they would have had time to consider Paul's words, realize his great care for them, and hopefully apply the things he wrote about.

THE PAINS OF CONFRONTATION

Paul wrote the severe letter out of an extremely troubled and anguished heart. Paul found no delight in correction, nor did he shy away from it.

Paul makes it clear that he did not intend to hurt them. Instead, his willingness to correct them
was born out of his abundant love for them.

UNFORGIVENESS (2 CORINTHIANS 2:5-11) "THIS PUNISHMENT BY THE MAJORITY..."

An unnamed man had caused trouble, so Paul instructed the church to discipline him for his sake and the sake of the church.

Whether this is the same man in 1 Corinthians 5 or a different man, it appears that the church
disciplined, and the man responded, repented, and was restored. However, the minority had not
offered forgiveness and comfort to him.

WE MUST DO BETTER!

Too often in church, we see the same mentality of the Corinthians and we swing from one extreme to another. We either ignore sin and keep a casual attitude about it or treat those who have genuinely repented too harshly.

 We either lack discipline or the grace of forgiving and comforting those who have committed an offense and are truly repentant.

SEEING IF THEY ARE OBEDIENT IN EVERYTHING

Paul shows that the purpose of restoring a sinner through church discipline was accomplished, so he instructs them to forgive and affirm their love for him.

 We should feel sorrow for our sins, but we are not to feel excessive sorrow because of our treatment post-repentance, lest we become discouraged.

CULTIVATING PEACE

We are to speak truth in peace, exposing the works of darkness (Ephesians 5:11–14, Colossians 4:6). There is a difference between peacekeepers and peacemakers. Passivity is not peace, and there cannot be peace without purity (James 3:13–18).

 The things we allow to fester or sweep under the rug tend to multiply and become worse in the end.

"SO THAT WE MAY NOT BE TAKEN ADVANTAGE OF"

To "take advantage" means to cheat someone out of something that belongs to them.

• If we ignore the reality of an enemy and his schemes against us, we open ourselves up to be taken advantage of. We allow Satan to take the things that belong to us through Christ, things like joy, peace, contentment, freedom, and salvation.

"FOR WE ARE NOT IGNORANT OF HIS SCHEMES"

Satan schemed against the man by exploiting a **weakness** of the flesh. Then through **isolation**, **hopelessness** and **despair** set in because of his sin. Satan schemed against the church through their **tolerance of sin**, **undue harshness** in punishment, and **withholding of forgiveness**. Satan tried to use these conflicts in Corinth to **rob Paul's peace and make him less effective in ministry**.

THE AROMA OF CHRIST (2 CORINTHIANS 2:12-17) UNABLE TO FIND REST IN HIS SPIRIT

Paul says the Lord opened a door for him, blessing his efforts, yet he had no rest in his spirit.

• The remarkable success Paul had in spreading the gospel in Troas was **overshadowed by the** deep concern he had for the Corinthians while awaiting Titus and his report.

"BUT THANKS BE TO GOD..."

Paul draws from the image of a Roman victory parade to communicate the triumphant victory he has in Christ.

 In a Roman victory parade the commander of the army would ride through town displaying the spoils of war, including the captive enemy. The Roman priests would walk with the procession burning incense.

"TO GOD WE ARE THE FRAGRANCE OF CHRIST"

The same aroma meant two different things depending on what group you were in. To the triumphant side, the incense meant life and victory, but to the conquered, it meant defeat and death.

Paul sees Christ as the victor and we are the fragrance that follows, communicating His victory.

The gospel communicates life to some and death to those who reject it (John 3:17–21).

WE SPEAK WITH SINCERITY

Paul reflects on God's plan to redeem humanity and our role in communicating it to the world and asks, "Who is adequate for these things?"

Paul answers this question in the next section of his letter but here he assures the Corinthians that
the gospel is too powerful and important to water down and that the message he taught is
pure and transparent.

TRUE LOVE

- To truly love means we put them first, but also we must be willing to put their good ahead
 of everything else.
- True love helps others grow. For plants to thrive, they need pruning. Discipline is evidence
 of true love (Hebrews 12).
- To truly love someone means we must forgive and encourage others.

THE SCHEMES OF SATAN

- Through the Spirit are we aware of the schemes the enemy is trying to use against us right now? Is there a weak point in our life that Satan is trying to exploit and gain a foothold?
- One scheme of the enemy is to keep us fighting a battle that has already been won. "We do not fight *for* victory; we fight *from* victory" (Wiersbe).
