THE LAW OF CHRIST (GALATIANS 6:1-5) WE ARE FREED TO LOVE OTHERS

Paul's letter to the Galatians was written to remind the church that **freedom comes by grace** (Ephesians 2:8) **and not the law.**

 To end his letter, Paul will now indicate that through the gospel of grace and the power of the Holy Spirit, we are free from self-centeredness and self-righteousness so we can love others.

"IF SOMEONE IS OVERTAKEN IN ANY WRÖNGDOING"

Overtaken communicates the idea of someone falling into sin, being overtaken in a weakness of the flesh and not habitual, premeditated, or deliberate sinful nature.

• There is a difference between those described here (6:1) and those described by Paul in 1 Corinthians 5:13, where we are told not to fellowship with unrepentant sinners claiming to be Christian.

"YOU WHO ARE SPIRITUAL, RESTORE [THEM]"

Our brothers and sisters who have been overtaken need to be restored. The verb used is a medical term for setting a fractured bone ("to put in order") and applied to the apostles mending their nets ("to restore to its former condition") in Mark 1:19.

• We cannot ignore the need for restoration or take delight in it.

"SO THAT YOU ALSO WON'T BE TEMPTED"

Restoration is to be sought **gently**, **biblically**, and **after careful self-evaluation**.

• The mature Christian attempting to restore a fellow Believer must do so **following the example** of Christ (Matthew 18:15–17), after honest self-evaluation (Matthew 7:3–5), and with a gentleness born out of our own weaknesses and propensity to sin.

THE LAW OF CHRIST FULFILLS THE LAW OF MOSES

The Judaizers required the Gentiles wanting to come into the faith to adopt all of the Jewish customs and laws in order to be part of the family of God, which created burdens.

Essentially, Paul says, "You want to require people to fulfill the law? Here is the law you need
to worry about fulfilling; bearing one another's burden to fulfill the law of Christ."

"IN THIS WAY YOU WILL FULFILL THE LAW OF CHRIST"

Jesus told the scribes who tried to trick him that the most important commandment is to **love God with** all your heart, soul, mind, and strength. Then, similarly, we are to love our neighbor as ourselves (Mark 12:28–31). Jesus went on to say that all will know that we are his disciples by the way we love one another (John 13:34–35).

"CARRY ONE ANOTHER'S BURDENS"

Verse 2 does not say, "Expect everyone else to bear your burdens," which is self-focused and causes pride, frustration, discouragement, and depression.

 We all have burdens, and God does not mean for us to carry them alone. We should be othersfocused, looking for a burden to bear and bearing it (Philippians 2:4).

A BACKPACK VERSUS A HEAVY BURDEN

There is no contradiction between verses 4–5 ("carrying his own load"), and verse 2 ("carry one another's burdens").

There is an allowable pride in meeting our responsibilities, because it frees us up to be able to help others. We must not compare ourselves to others and become deceived into believing that we are better than them.

REAPING WHAT WE SOW (GALATIANS 6:6-10) "SHARE ALL HIS GOOD THINGS"

In the context of bearing one another's burdens, Paul writes to make sure that those who are ministering to them are not neglected.

Though this has the idea of financial support, it is not limited to it. Instead, it communicates the
giving of a portion of all physical goods to the ministers not as a payment but through
thankfulness and generosity.

YES, THERE ARE ABUSES OF THIS PRINCIPLE!

Paul taught often that those who feed you and bless you spiritually should be supported by you financially (1 Corinthians 9:11, 9:14; 1 Timothy 5:17).

 Just because some take advantage of generosity does not mean we must stop being generous. Use wisdom and discernment in your generosity, but trust that God will bless your obedience.

"WHATEVER A PERSON SÓWS HE WILL ALSO REAP"

To back up his teaching, Paul shared the concept of reaping and sowing with those who were hesitant to share all good things with those who teach them.

 This imagery of planting and harvesting is communicating that giving all good things with those ministering isn't throwing goods away, it's planting.

"GOD IS NOT MOCKED"

Mocked means to disregard as if it is worthless and not worthy to be taken into account or to turn up one's nose.

Paul says this here to essentially say, "You can snub God if you choose, but that will never change truth." The "law of the harvest" (reap what you sow) is a fact that is unchanging and should not be ignored.

A FARMER REAPS WHAT HE HAS SOWN

Though the relationship between what is planted and harvested is exponential, you do not harvest exactly what was planted. Planting one apple seed does not give you a hundred apple seeds but a hundred apples.

 When we sow to the Spirit, we reap spiritual things, and when we sow to the flesh, the flesh will increase in size and strength.

OUR TENDENCY IS TO BE SELFISH

Paul gives us two principles applicable to doing good: don't lose heart and don't neglect those who belong to the household of faith.

When the work is hard and painful, it is easy to lose heart, but it is dangerous when the work
is unfinished and unrewarded. Not losing heart, we do good with our resources, especially to
those in God's family.

NEW CREATION (GALATIANS 6:11-18) A PERSONAL TOUCH

As was customary for Paul and the ancient world, he personally wrote the end portion of the letter, instead of a scribe, to authenticate his letter.

 Paul points out his writing was done with large letters. Some believe this was just to add emphasis, while others believe this was due to poor eyesight.

THE SELFISH MOTIVES OF THE LEGALISTS

Paul ends by **contrasting the impure motives of the Judaizers with his proper motives.** The legalists wanted the Gentiles to be circumcised through selfish motives **because it made them look good to the other Jewish believers**, and they wanted to **avoid persecution from other legalists and Rome** by advocating for obedience under the law and not the work of the cross.

MISPLACED EMPHASIS

The Judaizers put such an emphasis on the external practices exhibited by those in the family of God that they neglected the internal (Matthew 23:27–28).

• The external practices of circumcision or uncircumcision were not what was necessary. What is important is the internal transformative power of the Holy Spirit.

SERVANT OF CHRIST AND NOT THE LAW

Paul closes his letter by claiming, "[He] bear[s] on [his] body the marks of Jesus." Paul is not saying that he literally has nail marks in his hands and feet and a pierced side, but that he bears the marks or "brand," indicating he belongs to Christ.

• Paul identified with Jesus through his suffering (Philippians 3:10–11).

A NEW CREATION

- We must be careful not to impose unbiblical external practices on those wanting to be a part of the family of God.
- Our works should be a byproduct of transformation, but they are not a guaranteed indication of transformation.
- Christianity is not something we do for God, but it is something God does in us.
