THIS WEEK'S MESSAGE

JUNE 30TH, 2024 // 2 CORINTHIANS

COVENANTAL RELATIONSHIP (2 CORINTHIANS 11:1-4) "YES, DO PUT UP WITH ME!"

Paul encouraged the church to put up with a "little foolishness" from him as they had already done so.

They viewed his authority and attempt to reestablish his authority as foolishness. Paul is
reasonably asking that they continue reading his letter and put up with him a little longer.
 A GODLY JEALOUSY

Paul says **he is jealous** *for* **the Corinthians in the same way that God is jealous** *for* **us.** The sinful jealousy mentioned in Galatians 5:20 is different from the jealousy attributed to God when we worship and serve idols (Exodus 20:5).

Paul is jealous for the Corinthian people because they were given to him by God, and he
desires an intimate and loyal relationship.

COVENANTAL RELATIONSHIP

Paul says, "I have promised you in marriage to one husband—to present a pure virgin to Christ." Paul is like the friend of a bridegroom who is responsible for procuring a bride, protecting the bride, and presenting the bride on her wedding day.

Paul was called to procure, protect, and present the church to Christ.

THE BATTLE FOR OUR MINDS

Paul feared that the Corinthians had allowed their minds to be **seduced away from a sincere and pure devotion to Christ** in the same way the serpent deceived Eve.

 The words spoken from the enemy through false teachers may not always draw followers to themselves, but they will always draw others away from sincere and pure devotion to Christ.
 "...YOU PUT UP WITH IT SPLENDIDLY!"

There were some who taught a message contrary to what Paul taught, and instead of calling out these false teachers, they allowed them to spout out a false gospel.

 Like the Corinthians, we will all have to answer to Jesus for our lack of discernment and willingness to accept and embrace false teachers and leaders.

DISGUISE (2 CORINTHIANS 11:5-15)

"I AM UNTRAINED IN PUBLIC SPEAKING"

Polished, sophisticated, and theatric speech was popular in Paul's time and **the Corinthians desired teaching by this standard.**

Though Paul lacked the eloquent speech of the self-proclaimed "super-apostles" he was in no
way inferior but was superior to them because of the God-given knowledge and ability to
divide the word rightfully (2 Timothy 2:15).

"I HAVE KEPT MYSELF, AND WILL KEEP MYSELF..."

A speaker who spoke free of charge would have been **regarded as an amateur or as someone with worthless teaching.**

Paul said he instead "robbed other churches" to provide for him so that he was not a burden.
 What Paul lacked, the people in Macedonia provided in their poverty, when the Corinthians should have.

BOASTING IN OUR WEAKNESSES

What the Corinthians viewed as weakness and unimportance Paul viewed as a reason to "boast" (2 Corinthians 12:9).

His unimpressive speech and appearance embarrassed the Corinthians, but Paul would continue to
embarrass them in this way because He loved them and wanted to pull them out of worldly thinking.

"DISGUISING THEMSELVES AS APOSTLES OF CHRIST"

Paul calls the opposition in Corinth false apostles and deceitful workers. In reality, those who disguised themselves as apostles were more like Satan, who disguises himself as an angel of light, than God.

 Many of us only recognize evil when it presents itself as such, but can we recognize evil when it is disguised as good?

PERILOUS LIFE (2 CORINTHIANS 11:16-33) GIVING HIS CREDENTIALS AS AN APOSTLE

Paul is caught in the trap of having to boast though **he would rather be preaching Christ to those who deny his apostolic authority.**

• Instead of focusing on Christ as he desired (2 Corinthians 4:5), he was backed into a corner where in defense of his credentials **the focus was removed from Christ and placed on himself.**

"...BEING SO WISE, GLADLY PUT UP WITH FOOLS!"

Essentially Paul says, "You've unwisely put up with fools this far, who put you in bondage. Why not continue to put up with me?"

The Corinthians meekly submitted to all kinds of spiritual abuses of authority because they
were impressed with the image of authority and power of the "super-apostles."

TO SPEAK OR NOT TO SPEAK...

Following the wisdom of Proverbs 26:5, Paul knew the time called for him to "answer a fool according to his foolishness."

There are times when it is not profitable to contend with a fool in their foolishness lest we look like
a fool as well. Other times, when our tongue is guided, we must expose folly to avoid someone
becoming wise in their own eyes.

PAUL'S PERILOUS LIFE

Paul responded to the foolish in ways that spoke to them, though they were of little consequence to him.

Paul spoke of his ethnic pedigree as a Hebrew, the many external sufferings for the sake of the
gospel, and the many internal sufferings out of "concern for all the churches."

HE IS WORTHY TO BE PRAISED FOREVER

After being "forced" into boasting, Paul ends this section with a more appropriate boasting.

Paul abandoned the standards of his opponents showing that boasting in his weakness exalted
God as the source of his strength and protection in a time when he barely escaped with his life
while in Damascus (Acts 9:23–25).

WE ARE THE BRIDE OF CHRIST

- We have been betrothed ("promised to," sealed until the day of redemption) to Christ.
- Jesus will come back to claim his bride (us) and invite us to a great wedding banquet (Revelation 19:7-9).
- Until our wedding day, if we give our hearts to something other than Jesus, we are committing "spiritual adultery."

RIGHTLY DIVIDING THE WORD

- Spending time in truth is the only way to distinguish what is false.
- We must be diligent in studying the word and presenting ourselves as a workman approved by God (2 Timothy 2:15).
- In studying the word, our goal is to know the author. Do we know Psalm 23, or do we know the Shepherd?
